

## House Panel OKs Budget in Fiery Wee Hours

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WASHINGTON (March 22, 2007) - The House Budget Committee approved a \$2.96 trillion budget resolution early Thursday on a rigid party-line vote of 22-17 [Vote 26] after a prolonged partisan debate that focused heavily on the fate of the array of Republican-crafted tax cuts that are set to expire at the end of 2010.

Budget Chairman John Spratt, D-S.C., insisted that his proposal was "revenue neutral," while providing for substantial middle-class tax relief, including a temporary halt to the expanding affect of the alternative minimum tax. He cited language in the resolution that called for continuation of some of the most popular tax cuts, such as the \$1,000-per-child deduction, the lower tax rates, deductibility of state and local sales taxes for the seven states without an income tax and changing the so-called "death tax" so it covers only the very wealthiest estates. "We are pledging ourselves to the achievement of these goals."

Spratt also said the resolution (H.Con.Res. 99) fully funds President Bush's national security programs, while spending an additional \$22 billion for domestic priorities such as veterans' and children's health care; education, including college grants and loans; environmental protection and scientific research. And it puts the nation on the path toward a \$153 billion budget surplus in 2012 by restoring "pay-go" rules that require any spending increase or tax cut to be offset by savings or alternative revenue gains, he said.

The House proposal is very similar to the resolution approved last week on a party-line vote in the Senate Budget Committee. That proposal now is on the Senate floor. Ranking member Paul Ryan, R-Wisc., argued that Spratt's budget plan could forecast a surplus only because it counted on \$400 billion in additional revenues from the expiration of the tax cuts in 2010. "If we pass this Democrat budget, we will be passing the biggest tax increase in American history," Ryan said, using a phrase that Republicans would repeat scores of time during the subsequent debate that dragged on until final passage at 12:45 AM Thursday.

The Republicans also repeatedly criticized the Democrats for failing to address the entitlements crisis that experts expect after 2011 when the huge "baby boom" generation begins to draw on Social Security and Medicare. But Spratt argued that the entitlement problem must be dealt with by a future bi-partisan group of lawmakers or outside experts and was beyond the scope of the FY 2008 budget.

Although final passage came after midnight, the committee agreed that would meet the House deadline for filing the resolution in order for it to be on the floor next week. During the floor fight, Ryan said, the Republicans would offer an alternative budget that would achieve a balanced budget while preserving all the tax cuts. "We'll do it the old-fashion way, by cutting spending," he said.

The agreement on the filing deadline was one of the few bi-partisan actions in the lengthy and rancorous debate that saw the Democrats reject 26 GOP amendments with solid party discipline. The committee did accept two amendments on voice votes: A "sense of Congress" statement offered by Ryan that the states should not take any part of a parent's child support payments, and language proposed by Rep. Scott Garrett, R-N.J., to require the VA to pay for burying a veteran's spouse in a state veterans cemetery, as it does for internment in a federal cemetery.

But the pattern for the evening was set early by rejection of the first amendment, that Ryan said would "make a statement, here and now, not to raise taxes" during the years covered by the budget resolution. Despite the Democrats' claims, Ryan said, the budget resolution counts on the additional revenues from letting the tax cuts expire. "I really believe if this budget comes to pass, we will have serious economic consequences."

But Democrats said top economists dispute the GOP claims that the tax cuts paid for themselves through increased revenues from economic expansion. And they argued that the "pay-go" discipline would allow Congress in the future to decide which of the tax reductions to extend.

Rep. Lloyd Doggett, D-Texas, said the GOP tax increase rhetoric follows the first law of Disneyland: "Wishing will make it so." He said there were no instructions in the resolution to the House Ways and Means Committee, on which he serves, to raise taxes.

Ryan's amendment failed on party-line of 21-16 [Vote 1].

The committee later rejected on similar votes amendments seeking to preserve each of the major tax cuts, one to limit what the IRS could do to close the "tax gap" of uncollected taxes that the Democrats count on to help pay for their spending increases, an attempt to restrict the "pay-go" offset requirements to increased spending, not tax cuts, and a proposal to give the president limited line-item authority.

An early round of amendments offered by Republicans focused strictly on tax policy, with Republicans attempting to preserve cuts they had made since 2001.

Rep. Earl Blumenauer, D-Ore., said the Republicans needed to "come into the real world," and realize that "tax cuts don't pay for themselves."

Rep. Jeb Hensarling introduced the next amendment after he said he was "shocked and chagrined" to find out there was no entitlement reform in the budget resolution.

Hensarling's self-described "modest" amendment would limit mandatory spending to grow at 5 percent instead of 5.11 percent. The amendment was defeated 21-17 [Vote 2].

Democrats also opposed an amendment by Rep. Patrick Tiberi, R-Ohio, which would have made the 2001 tax cuts permanent. The amendment was defeated 22-16 [Vote 3] after Rep. Xavier Becerra, D-Calif., told Tiberi, "Tax cuts don't grow on trees," and said the only way to afford the tax cuts would be to increase deficit spending. An amendment [Vote 4] offered by Rep. John Campbell, R-Calif., to extend the capital gains and dividends tax cuts, was defeated 21-17 for the same reasons.

Next up for the Republicans was Rep. Jon Porter, R-Nev., who offered an amendment to extend the \$1,000 child tax credit. Porter accused Democrats of cutting the credit to \$500. Porter said the cut "impacts families of all income levels." Spratt called the amendment a "red herring," and said the amendment actually endorsed extending the credit. The amendment was defeated 21-16 [Vote 5]. An amendment [Vote 6] offered by Rep. Jo Bonner, R-Ala., to extend relief from the "marriage penalty" tax, was also defeated 21-16 after Democrats called it redundant. "Your actions are so loud we can hardly hear your words," Hensarling said, accusing Democrats of attempting to raise taxes.

Another attempt at extending a tax cut, offered by Rep. Mario Diaz-Balart, R-Fla., was to extend the elimination of the estate tax. "There should be no taxation without respiration," he said. Democrats rejected the offer 22-17 [Vote 7], again citing a potential increase in deficit spending.

Another tax-related amendment rejected by Democrats 22-17 [Vote 8] was another Porter offering to extend the state and local sales tax deduction to seven states. "This isn't the government's money, it's the people's money," Ryan said. Spratt opposed the amendment, saying there would be plenty of time over the coming years to make a decision on how to extend the Bush tax cuts, which do not expire until the end of 2010.

The final tax-related amendment, offered by Rep. Thaddeus McCotter, R-Mich., and Rep. Scott Garrett, R-N.J., was a sense of the Congress amendment on closing the tax gap. The amendment was defeated 22-16 [Vote 9] after Democrats said the amendment had potential to become a "tax cheat protection" amendment.

After the tax amendments, a wide range of amendments followed. Hensarling offered an amendment, to adopt a legislative line-item veto. The rule would have required a vote on all vetoes by the president. Hensarling said the amendment could be used to make earmarks more transparent. Democrats rejected the amendment 22-16 [Vote 12] after raising concerns that it would have no effect. Another earmark amendment, offered by Rep. Michael Conaway, R-Texas, would have required earmarks to be included in legislative text. Rep. Rosa DeLauro, D-Conn., opposed the amendment, questioning Republicans' timing after Democrats passed earmark reform legislation earlier in the year. The amendment was defeated 23-15 [Vote 13]. Rep. Michael Simpson, Idaho, sided with Democrats.

Two healthcare amendments also failed. The first, offered by Ryan, would have reauthorized the State Children's Health Insurance Program with \$15 billion for five years. Ryan said the funding would cover an additional 1.7 million children, while financing it with a cut of .3 percent of non Social Security discretionary spending to offset the cost. Democrats rejected the amendment 20-16 [Vote 11] after Spratt called it a "half measure." An amendment offered by Rep. Connie Mack, R-Fla., would have capped medical malpractice suits to \$500,000 per case. Mack said malpractice lawsuits "force doctors into practicing defensive medicine." Democrats refused the measure, 20-16 [Vote 16], after Rep. Brian Baird, D-Wash., said the insurance industry also needs to be investigated for their role in high malpractice insurance costs.

An amendment offered by Bonner, which would have required "pay-go" rules to apply to spending and require bills to be deficit neutral, was defeated 20-15 [Vote 10], after Rep. Bob Etheridge, D-N.C., said it would increase the deficit. Democrats also pointed out that they already require all spending to be deficit neutral.

Another "pay-go" amendment, offered by Rep. Patrick McHenry, R-N.C., sought assurances from Democrats that they would not raise taxes on reserve funds. "This is a 'pay-go' amendment that says you can't tax and go," McHenry said. The amendment was defeated 20-17 [Vote 20] after Rep. Chet Edwards, D-Texas, said it would prevent Congress from taking action on tax shelters.

There were also a slew of amendments that sought to limit discretionary spending. An amendment, offered by Conaway, sought to require offsets for all new programs by making cuts from other programs. "If you can't find something that's less important...you're telling us your program is the least important," Conaway said. The amendment was defeated 19-17 [Vote 19], after Democrats said they had already set priorities on spending.

Another spending reduction was sought by Rep. Rodney Alexander, R-La.,. Alexander wanted to enforce the Program Assessment Rating Tool, which, if a program is found to be ineffective, would have its budget frozen at the 2007 funding level. The amendment was defeated 20-17 [Vote 21] after Etheridge said the rule would make it too easy for programs to be eliminated by people wanting to start their own.

Another amendment offered by Hensarling sought to cap the growth of discretionary spending as 2.1 percent of the GDP. The amendment, which Hensarling said was supported by Blue Dog Democrats years earlier, was defeated 20-15 [Vote 22], after Rep. Allen Boyd, D-Fla., said that Hensarling picked out one part of what the Blue Dogs believe. An amendment offered by Rep. J. Gresham Barrett, R-S.C., would require a freeze on non-defense, non-veterans, non-discretionary spending. After Barrett asked Democrats to "put your money where your mouth is," the amendment was defeated 21-13 [Vote 23].

Another Barrett amendment would have tightened language on emergency spending, after Republicans repeatedly voiced opposition to earmarks put in the current

supplemental resolution before the House on funding the war in Iraq. The amendment was defeated 21-15 [Vote 14], after Blumenauer said the cap proposed by Barrett was "substantially below" what typical spending amounts have been in emergency spending situations.

Another spending amendment, sponsored by Hensarling, would have required cost estimates in all conference reports and roll call votes in the House on all spending above \$50 million. Democrats refused the amendment, 22-17 [Vote 25], due to fears that forcing the Congressional Budget Office to review all legislation for "pay-go" violations would stall the legislative process.

In veterans issues, an amendment offered by Conaway sought to establish a "firewall" on BRAC-related funding. The amendment failed, 22-15 [Vote 15], after Edwards asked why Republicans were "asking for a firewall to protect the funding they voted against." Edwards also voiced opposition to a Hensarling amendment calling for a "firewall" around Veterans Affairs discretionary spending. The amendment failed, 20-16 [Vote 17], after Edwards said it was unnecessary, saying Democrats already provided the largest increase in VA funding history in the budget.

An amendment, offered by Rep. Daniel Lungren, R-Calif., sought an increase in border security funding. "At least we can agree we need to do a far better job on border security," Lungren said. The amendment failed, 20-17 [Vote 18], after Rep. Timothy Bishop, D-N.Y., said the budget increases the president's budget proposal for border security by \$1 billion.

Democrats also rejected, 23-12 [Vote 24], a Porter amendment that would have defunded the Yucca Mountain nuclear waste storage site in Nevada. Porter called the project "fiscally and scientifically irresponsible," and "one of the biggest wastes of taxpayer dollars in the history of this country. Blumenauer voiced opposition, saying the amendment would totally defund the Department of Energy's office of civilian waste management, which is too important to discuss for five to 10 minutes after 14 hours of budget debate.
